

# 2022 USS Nimitz (CVN-68) Association Reunion Host/Coordinators Summary Submitted by David & Carol Wood 10-23-22



## Day 1

Embarkation-Tampa Florida: We began our reunion by getting onboard the ship on Saturday October 15<sup>th</sup>. All attendees (18 Members & 11 Spouses), including several first-time attendees and first time "cruisers", mustered in the Adriatic conference room on the Serenade of the Seas. This was the first voyage of the ship since returning from the west coast and Alaska, having just come through the Panama Canal earlier this week. We gathered at dinner that evening, four tables in close proximity to each other and the seas stories and the good times began!

### Day 2

At Sea: Our first day was a day at sea which was a great time for us to hold our annual business meeting. The meeting was called to order by President Rich Galecki. John Wilder presented the results of the financial audit and distributed the scholarship applications/essays to several members and board members to score. We have a balance of over \$20,000 in the Association bank account. The financial audit was accepted/approved by the membership. The Scholarship awardee will be reported out at our second business meeting. Nominations for President were Gary Rollins and John Wilder, the election will also take place during the second business meeting on Wednesday. Father Peter, Dave Wood and Rich Galecki, conducted the two-bell ceremony. The chief of security (John) gave a brief presentation about the ship, which has been selected for an around the world cruise. The Serenade is the only Gas Turbine vessel in the Royal Caribbean fleet. One very interesting fact is that it gets 40 feet to the gallon.... now that is a gas hog!! Dave Wood presented a plaque to the Chief of Security in recognition for being the host for the 2022 Reunion.

All hands were treated to a personalized video message from the USS Nimitz CO, Captain Sicola, to the Association. He provided the attendees an update on the ship's activities. As always this was one of the highlights of the business meeting and a comfort to hear that we left the ship in good hands. We will be posting this to our website and Facebook page. Nominations for the location of the 2024 Reunion we solicited. Potential sites were Charleston, SC; Milwaukee, WI; Niagara Falls, NY; Minneapolis/St Paul, MN; Nashville, TN; Myrtle Beach, SC. A vote was held, and Charleston was selected as the site for the 2024 Reunion.

Myrl Wallace gave an update on the 2023 reunion in Tempe, AZ. The hotel selected is the Embassy Suites in Tempe and the dates are Oct 16-18<sup>th</sup>. Additional reunion and hotel information will be forthcoming in the next Association newsletter.

Dave Wood presented a plaque to our Chaplin, Fr Peter, for his 20 years of dedicated service to the Association. Fr then shared a story about healing from an experience he had with military men that fought on opposite sides of a war. The presentation was heartwarming. Dave Wood also presented a plaque to Rich Galecki for his dedicated service to the Association as president for the past 4 years. Rich gave thanks for all of the members for their support and input during his tenure. Rich will step down at the end of this years' reunion to be replaced by the winner of the vote later in the week.

There was a good deal of discussion about the state of the Association website, and it was a unanimous decision that this should be a primary focus of the new President. It was also discussed that the future direction of the website (delete or update) should be made within the next 90 to 120 days.

The meeting was suspended for the day, to be reconvened in three days.

The afternoon found the members at the pool or exploring the ship. The ship also was host to the International Belly Flop contest and the Association was honored to have two participants selected to participate. Howard Kamarata and Steve Crabtree represented the Association well. Hundreds gathered around the pool while another 200+ hung over the railing one deck above to get a glimpse of our gallant participants. Although neither won the event, they both had a respectable showing!

# Day 3

<u>Grand Cayman Island</u>: We were so fortunate that the ship is too large to dock at this port, so we were treated to "liberty boats". Fond memories and years of therapy went down the drain. Actually, the liberty boats were clean, the crews friendly and all in all a very different experience than most remembered from their Navy days!

Many of the attendees enjoyed the tours available on the island, from horseback riding to getting some sun on the beautiful beaches. Others strolled around town, stopping for ice cold beers and conch fritters as well as other tasty treats.

Once back on the ship, there was a Veterans Celebration for all veterans on board. The Association was honored to have Fr Peter (Chaplin) and John Wilder (flag bearer) participate in the ceremony. As always Fr Peter shared a very relevant military story. This was held in the center of the ship (Centrum) with passengers leaning over the railing on 5 different decks to see the ceremony. Afterwards there was a good deal of talking with other veterans and passengers. It was great to see that all branches were represented.

### Day 4
